Washington diary: "Received from on board the brig Ann, from Meland, two servant men, ~~for~~ whom I had agreed yesterday, viz., Thomas Ryan, a Shoemaker, and Caved Boves, a ~~tailor~~ Taylor, redemptioners for 3 years service by indenture if they could not pay each the

sum of £12 sterling, which  
sums I agreed to pay. The  
brig Ann arrived at the Port of  
from Waterford Ireland on June 13,  
1786. How long these men remained  
in Washington's service is not  
known since they are not further  
mentioned in records now  
available.
