

4. Ryan, James
Maryland

BLWT 1120-100

On April 15, 1825 warrant 1120 was issued to William Ryan, heir to James Ryan, a private in the Maryland line, for 100 acres of military bounty land.

According to information supplied by his heir James Ryan was first mustered in April 1777 as a private in the Fifth Maryland Regiment. On 16 August 1778 he was marked "missing". The records state that he was designated as enlisted for the duration of the war and thus entitled to military bounty land.

affidavits contained in the file establish the following: a James Ryan, private in Rawlings'

Maryland Regiment enlisted
26 June 1779, date of discharge
blank. A James Ryan, in
the 3rd Maryland Regiment
received pay in arrears as
follows:

1 August 1780 to 1 January 1782	\$80.
1 January 1782 to 1 January 1783	\$80.
1 January 1783 to 15 November 1783	\$70.

He was presumed to have
been taken prisoner in 1778.

On 26 April 1825 William Ryan
received Military Land Warrant
No 1120 bearing date of 15 April
1825. It is signed William ^{his} Ryan.

He was the only surviving heir
of James Ryan, deceased. The wife
of James, Nancy Goodlin signed
deposition 17 July 1824. She appears
to be living with her son.
